

# MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

#### Dear Parents

With only two weeks until, the Winter break, the list of events taking place at the school seems almost endless. From National Day celebrations, to numerous sporting events, from council elections to Governors Meetings, from concerts to pantomimes, these final days will certainly be busy. In addition to all of these, normal teaching and learning continues through the corridors and this week's news of upcoming inspection, simply adds to the momentum that is Hartland life.

Last week, in a letter of brief updates, I wrote to you on the issue of our revised Rewards System. During this week, the awarding of House Points and Merits has been explained to the students and already, there is a sense of excitement. You may have seen our new feature in the main reception area: four containers mounted for the collection of house points for each of the four Houses.

The aims of the policy are simple: to promote the Hartland Values, reinforce positive behaviour at every opportunity and ensure that students understand that they are a valued part of the school community and society generally. Though this may seem like a rather lofty statement, the philosophy and practice are of course explained to the children in a manner befitting their age and stage.

Good behaviour and high standards of work are expected at all times at Hartland. However, it is important to celebrate excellence. Therefore, House Points will be awarded for:

- Excellent work
- Outstanding effort
- · Outstanding contribution to school life
- Outstanding contribution to society outside school
- · Significant demonstration of Hartland Values

A House Point will be given in the shape of a coloured token for each House which students should place in the House Points collection container. Class teachers and form tutors will also keep a tally record for each student of points awarded which will go towards individual rewards of certificates of recognition:

Certificates will be issued as follows in relation to House Points:

Class Teacher / Form Tutor	20
Head of Key Stage	30
Head of House / House Captain	40
Vice Principal / SLT	50
Principal	60

As the work at Key Stage 3 leading to GCSE becomes more demanding, 1 Merit (equivalent to 5 House Points) will be awarded for an outstanding piece of coursework or an outstanding contribution to school or community life.

The coloured tokens are already filling the case of the containers and I am sure that we will see the numbers rise quickly. We are also discussing how we can engage our Foundation Stage children in this system, for at present, they have not been divided into Houses. Ms Nazarian will update you on their inclusion in the weeks ahead.

School reports will be issued also during the last week of term and I will write to you again before the holiday period. In the meantime, I hope that you enjoy this week's newsletter and hope to see you at one of the school events over the next nine days.

## **UAE NATIONAL AGENDA FOR PARENTS**

His Highness Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum, Vice-President and Prime Minister of the UAE and Ruler of Dubai, launched a seven year UAE National Agenda in 2014 leading to the UAE Vision 2021 which also coincides with the UAE's 50th National Day.





The UAE National Agenda, which was developed by over 300 officials from 90 federal and local government entities, includes a set of national indicators in the sectors of education, healthcare, economy, police and security, housing, infrastructure and government services.

These indicators are long-term, measure performance outcomes in each of the national priorities, and generally compare the UAE against global benchmarks. The national indicators are periodically monitored by Government leadership to ensure their targets are achieved by 2021.

As we approach inspection it is important that parents of our community are aware of the National Agenda items pertaining to education as parents will be asked in the survey or in interview if they are aware of these priorities.

The Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA) is a test given every 3 years to students aged 15 years old. Students are selected randomly by the Government to sit the test that will evaluate education systems worldwide by testing their skills and knowledge of 15-year-old students. The next PISA is in 2018.

The Trends in International Mathematics and Science (TIMSS) is a series of international assessments of the mathematics and science knowledge of students around the world. Students in Year 5 and Year 9 undertake these assessments. TIMSS are generally administered every four years. The next TIMSS will be in 2019.

The National Agenda also includes the implementation of the UAE Moral Education Programme in its school timetable as well as a mapping of the new UAE Social Studies curriculum just published. At Hartland School the UAE Moral Education curriculum built on 4 pillars is delivered in stand along one hour lessons weekly in Years 1-8.

### **Winter Concert**





### THINK BEFORE YOU CLICK







On November 22, students in Years 4, 5, and 6 had the opportunity to attend an E-safety workshop run by Kaspersky. 'Think before you Click' was the key message of the workshop. Students had to think about the repercussions of their online activity-will it hurt others, could it potentially hurt me, or those who I care about the most?

At Hartland, we have regular 'e-safety' activities to remind children of the importance of keeping themselves safe online.

At home, children may be given unsupervised access to the Internet. This, potentially, allows them to access all kinds of society (both good and bad) and bring them virtually into their homes.

Here are some tips and useful links to help you to keep your children safe online:

#### **Ground Rules**

Discuss as a family, how the internet will be used in your home. Consider what should be kept private online (personal information and photos) and decide rules for making and meeting online friends. Make sure you know what your child is doing online much like you would offline.

#### **Online Safety**

Install antivirus software, secure your internet connection and use Parental Control functions for computers, mobile phones and games consoles to block unsuitable content or contact. Remember that parental control tools are not always 100% effective and sometimes unsuitable content can get past them, so do not rely on them alone to protect your child.

#### Location

Locate your computer, tablets, phones and their use, in a supervised family area. Always supervise the use of webcams and applications which allow voice or video chat. Consider your child's use of other devices that allow internet access such as mobile phones and games consoles.

Dialogue Talk to your child and ask them to show or even teach you how they use the Internet, learn which websites or tools they like to use and why. Learning together can often open opportunities to discuss safe behaviour with your child. Always ensure your child knows how to block or report people online who send nasty or inappropriate messages or content. Encourage your child not to retaliate or reply. Make sure your child knows to tell an adult they trust if they see something online that makes them feel scared, worried or uncomfortable. It is essential to be realistic, banning the internet or technology will not work and it often makes a child less likely to report a problem. Education around safe use is essential.


